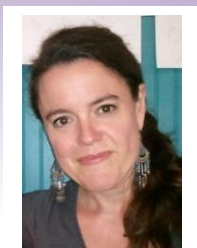


**Message from the

The goals of these classes are to:

- strengthen and support each child's sense of self and self-esteem
- help children recognize and appreciate their bodies as good and beautiful, private and special
- help children prepare for the normal changes they will experience as they grow and develop
- help children develop the interpersonal skills – including communication, decision-making, and problem-solving – that will keep them safe and healthy
- engage families in open communication about life questions
- strengthen parents' roles as their children's most important educator

Our Whole Lives

- Accurate information presented in developmentally and age-appropriate ways
- Activities that help participants clarify values and improve decision-making skills
- Safe community
- Affirmation of parents as their children's primary educator

Underlying Values

- All children should be loved and cared for, respected and valued as unique individuals
- Children learn from how people touch them, talk with them, and expect them to behave as males and females
- The messages children receive about sexuality, their bodies, and identity affect their future attitudes, values, and behaviors
- Information about human development, relationships and health should be presented to children in positive, accurate, and developmentally supportive ways

Our Whole Lives recognizes and respects diversity with respect to biological sex, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, and disability. Affirming and supportive community can be life saving for children and youth.

Our Whole Lives for Children

Children are exposed to images and messages about self and others through television, movies, the internet, music, and video games. They are growing up in a world of confusing, unhealthy, and sometimes dangerous messages about bodies, safety, self-image, and relationships. The *Our Whole Lives* curriculum for children offers accurate and age-appropriate information, in a safe environment, and grounded in the values of self-worth, health, responsibility, and justice.

Parents are their children's primary educators, playing a central role in their emotional development. The HomeLink activities offer parents an opportunity to be intentional about conversations with their children. By supporting children and genuine interest in their thoughts, feelings and decision-making processes, parents can have the most influence on their children's developing decision-making capacity.
